20a. How does the Committee accomplish its purpose?

The Board shall review annually the programs of the National Fire Academy (Academy) and advise the FEMA Administrator through the U.S. Fire Administrator regarding the operation of the Academy and any improvements therein that the Board of Visitors (Board) deems appropriate. The Board shall make interim advisories to the FEMA Administrator through the U.S. Fire Administrator whenever there is an indicated urgency to do so in fulfilling its duties.1. In carrying out their responsibilities, the Board shall include in their

review: a. An examination of Academy programs to determine whether these programs further the basic missions which are approved by the FEMA Administrator; b. An examination of the physical plant of the Academy to determine the adequacy of the Academy facilities; and, c. An examination of the funding levels for the Academy programs. 2. The Board shall submit its annual report through the U.S. Fire Administrator to the FEMA Administrator, in writing. This report shall provide detailed comments and recommendations regarding the operation of the Academy. The Board shall submit interim reports through the U.S. Fire Administrator to the FEMA Administrator whenever there is an indicated need to do so in the fulfillment of its duties. The National Fire Academy Superintendent is the Designated Federal Officer who attends each meeting of the Board and is authorized, whenever he/she so determines it to be in the public interest, to adjourn any such meeting. The FEMA Administrator can designate a member of the management staff of the U.S. Fire Administration to be the Designated Federal Officer. The Board shall not conduct meetings in the absence of the Designated Federal Officer or his/her designee. By way of their actions, the Board helps the NFA provide the Nation's fire and emergency response community with enhanced knowledge, skills, and abilities through its vital training and professional development programs. In turn, by training tens of thousands of career and volunteer emergency response personnel annually, the Academy helps to ensure a broad well-trained presence across the Nation, and this heightened all-hazard / all-risk preparedness level is crucial to preventing and responding to fire and other related hazards, including acts of terrorism.

20b. How does the Committee balance its membership?

The members of the Board consists of professionals from the fields of fire safety, fire prevention (such as community risk reduction to include wildland urban interface), fire control research and development in fire protection, treatment and rehabilitation of fire victims, or local government services management, and from such professional organizations as will ensure a balanced representation of fire and emergency services interests. Members will be appointed as Special Government Employees (SGEs) as defined in section 202(a) of title 18, United States Code.

20c. How frequent and relevant are the Committee Meetings?

Depending on funding availability and scheduling considerations, the Board meets as often as needed to fulfill its mission, but not less than once each Federal fiscal year at the National Emergency Training Center in Emmitsburg, Maryland, to address its objectives and duties. Permission to meet at an alternate location may be granted by the U.S. Fire Administrator. Other meetings may be held via conference call. At a meeting, the Board may address a specific issue such as preparing the Board's Annual Report or receive overviews on Academy curriculum, programs, and delivery.

20d. Why can't the advice or information this committee provides be obtained elsewhere?

The Fire Service is parochial in nature with a tradition of over 200 years that often results in vested interests among the various sectors of the fire community. While there are many other sources from which to obtain information,

guidance, and evaluation, none serve as well as this relatively unbiased group of professionals which represent the interest of the greater fire community universe. Its membership comes from all sectors and thus provides an internal check and balance with regard to their counsel and advice.

This requires a scalable and capable National Incident workforce that can adapt and deploy to a changing risk landscape, greater integration with our partners at all levels, and the ability to communicate and coordinate effectively in every situation. The Board annually reviews the Academy's training programs to determine whether they further the mission as approved by the Agency's Administrator. The Board makes recommendations for improvement, inspects the physical facilities in Emmitsburg, Maryland, and reviews funding levels for all Academy training programs.
