20a. How does the Committee accomplish its purpose?

The Council's purpose is to provide recommendations to the Federal Government, through the Secretary of the Interior and the Secretary of Agriculture, regarding policies and endeavors that (a) benefit wildlife resources; (b) encourage partnership among the public; sporting

conservation organizations; and Federal, State, Tribal, and territorial governments; and (c) benefit fair chase recreational hunting and safe recreational shooting sports. The Council meets to discuss and make these recommendations.

20b. How does the Committee balance its membership?

Council representation is balanced in relation to its mission as specified in its charter. The members are senior-level representatives of their organizations and/or have extensive knowledge and experience within the hunting and wildlife conservation communities.

20c. How frequent and relevant are the Committee Meetings?

The Council was designed to meet approximately 2 times per year. At these meetings, members will discuss recommendations to put forward to both the Secretary of the Interior and the Secretary of Agriculture.

20d. Why can't the advice or information this committee provides be obtained elsewhere?

Because of their professional affiliations and experiences, the members of the Council are uniquely positioned to provide advice to to the Departments related to hunting, recreational shooting, and wildlife conservation. Members of the Council have years of experience as managers, advocates, and participants in the wildlife conservation and recreation field. There is no equivalent body of advisers empaneled to assist the Departments.

There were eight recommendations made in FY 2023. 1) HWCC recommends and encourages you to consider prioritizing early BIL/IRA funding towards forest health project. 2) The Climate-Smart Agriculture and Forestry Mitigation Activities List be expanded to include critical conservation practices in addition to those that directly reduce and mitigate greenhouse emissions. 3) Encourages USDA to broaden flexibility and availability of waivers for Adjusted Gross Income and other payment limitations, where authorized, to capitalize on the best and most efficient conservation opportunities. 4) Encourages the USDA to work with this Council and other agricultural and conservation stakeholders to identify and implement practices that complement the current activities list, support co-benefits to agricultural producers and the environment, and support a conservation system-based approach to program administration. 5) Recommends adopting the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations definition on climate-smart agriculture. 6) Recommends improving wetland determinations as identified

in the Government Accountability Office report to the Senate Agriculture Committee in April 2021 and recommend full implementation of the GAO's six recommendations. 7) Urge DOI and USDA to cooperate with the same partners who helped secure this funding to identify and prioritize project opportunities on both the National Wildlife Refuge System and state-owned Wildlife Management Areas to have the greatest impact on improving quality habitat while also providing outdoor recreation opportunities for the American people. 8) Urge DOI and USDA to utilize every authority you have to deploy as many resources to the administration of these funds as soon as possible.
