20a. How does the Committee accomplish its purpose?

The U.S. Department of Energy established the Appliance Standards and Rulemaking Federal Advisory Committee (ASRAC) was established in an effort to further improve the U.S. Department of Energy's process of establishing energy efficiency standards for certain appliances and commercial equipment. ASRAC will allow DOE to use negotiated rulemaking as a means to engage all interested parties, gather data, and attempt to reach consensus on establishing energy efficiency standards. Rules drafted by negotiation may be more pragmatic and implemented at earlier dates than under a more traditional rulemaking process. To effectively accomplish its purpose, ASRAC, in consultation with the Building Technologies Office, will create working groups to meet and negotiate standards and/or other needs. Broader topics will be handled by the Committee directly.

20b. How does the Committee balance its membership?

Members will be selected with a view toward achieving a balanced committee of experts in fields relevant to energy efficiency, appliance and commercial equipment standards, to include DOE, as well as representatives of industry (including manufacturers and trade associations representing manufacturers, component manufacturers and related suppliers, and retailers), utilities, energy efficiency/environmental advocacy groups and consumers. Members are selected on the basis of established records of distinguished service in their professional community and their knowledge relevant to the function of the Committee. If any vacancies occur during the life of the Committee, the designated Federal Officer will solicit additional nominations, develop a new candidate list, identify the best qualified candidates to replace the missing points of view, and initiate the appointment process within the U.S. Department of Energy.

20c. How frequent and relevant are the Committee Meetings?

The Committee is expected to meet approximately twice per year, or as necessary. For each working group, ASRAC is expected to set deadlines for negotiations, including status checks. During these status checks, ASRAC will hold an open meeting (likely by webinar) to hear from the working group and will provide relevant feedback.

20d. Why can't the advice or information this committee provides be obtained elsewhere?

The Appliance Standards and Rulemaking Federal Advisory Committee was established in an effort to further improve the U.S. Department of Energy's process of establishing energy efficiency standards for certain appliances and commercial equipment. Specifically, the Committee was established in accordance with with Executive Order 13563, Improving Regulation and Regulatory Review, with the provisions of the Federal Advisory Committee Act, as amended, the Negotiated Rulemaking Act of 1965, 5 U.S.C. 561 et. seq., and the Administrative Procedure Act (APA), 5 U.S.C. 551 et. seq. The Committee will provide a diverse group of stakeholders representing a broad range of interests to negotiate and, if possible, reach consensus on recommendations to form Notice of Proposed Rules on Federal standards for appliances and commercial equipment. ASRAC will assist DOE in creating a nimble and timely mechanism for interested parties to engage in meaningful dialogue, and for the Department to have access to the experience, advice, and recommendations of knowledgeable and affected parties of the standards to be set forth. This communication among stakeholders can develop a clearer understanding of the complex issues surrounding such standards.

21. Remarks

The ASRAC did meet in FY2023 and approved term sheets negotiated by working group that

recommended test procedures and energy conservation standards for commercial unitary air conditioners and heat pumps. The Department accepted the approved recommendations from the ASRAC for consideration in rulemaking proceedings. The ASRAC is expected to meet in FY24 as required under its charter but is not expected to establish any new working groups during this period.

These efforts are consistent with the Executive Order 13563, Improving Regulation and Regulatory Review, that states "Regulations shall be adopted though a process that involves public participation ... Before issuing a notice of proposed rulemaking, each agency, where feasible and appropriate, shall seek the views of those who are likely to be affected, including those who are likely to benefit from and those who are potentially subject to such rulemaking." By actively engaging the public and affected stakeholders, it is likely that rules drafted by negotiation may be more pragmatic and implemented at earlier dates.

Recommendations to date have centered around two functions:1. The formation of working groups to discuss and, if possible, reach consensus on a proposed rule. 2. Efforts of the working group are discussed and openly deliberated by ASRAC members and are formed into recommendations to the Appliance and Equipment Standards Program to inform the development of the program's rulemaking efforts surrounding the working group topic. To date, there have been 13 recommended working group formations. Ten of thirteen working groups have provided recommendations that led to Notice of Proposed Rulemakings (NOPR).
