20a. How does the Committee accomplish its purpose?

The Bureau of Indian Education (BIE) Advisory
Board for Exceptional Children (Board) typically
meets three to four times per year to review and
discuss various BIE documents and processes,
Special Education (SPED) Integrated Monitoring
Process; SPED 616 and 618 data, SPP/APR
Indicator data performance, Office of SPED
Programs (OSEP) official monitoring reports; U.S.
Department of Education (DOE) reports; Indian
School Equalization Program data; and the BIE

Reorganization Plan, BIE Strategic Direction, SPED Policy & Procedures Handbook, SPED Coordinated Services Plan. As a stakeholder, the Board provides input and receives comments from parents, Tribal Education Departments, Tribally Controlled School personnel, Bureau Operated School personnel, BIE departments, and other stakeholders and other interested individuals interested in improving services for students with disabilities by receiving comments during the Board meetings. The Board uses information obtained from the various resources to advise and offer recommendations to improve services for students with disabilities and to support the BIE in carrying out the provisions of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Improvement Act of 2004.

20b. How does the Committee balance its membership?

Public Law 108-446, Individuals with Disabilities Education Act of 2004 (IDEA) establishes the membership requirements. As required by the Act, the Advisory Board is composed of 15 individuals involved in or concerned with the education and provisions of services to Indian children with disabilities. The Advisory Board composition reflects a broad range of viewpoints and includes at least one member representing each of the following interests: Indian persons with disabilities; Teachers of children with disabilities: Indian parents/quardians of children with disabilities; Service providers; State Education Officials; Local education officials; State inter-agency coordinating councils (for states having Indian reservations); Tribal representatives or tribal organization representatives and BIE/BIA employees concerned with the education of children with disabilities.

20c. How frequent and relevant are the Committee Meetings?

The Advisory Board typically meets 2-4 times per year.

20d. Why can't the advice or information this committee provides be obtained elsewhere?

The Advisory Board is required under Public Law 108-446, Individuals with Disability Education Act; and it is necessary to gain input and advice from individuals concerned with ensuring special education services and related services are provided to children with disabilities throughout the BIE education system; and meaningful student participation is achieved and student academic achievement progress is being met.

20e. Why is it necessary to close and/or partially closed committee meetings?

The Advisory Board meetings are open to the general public.

Cost Savings Comments

During FY 2023 several factors were involved that prompted operational cost savings: The BIE had a total of 4 Board meetings. All meetings were offered online and in-person. On average 4 members (out of 14 total members) traveled to the board meetings, which is less than half of the total committee members. The other nine Board members opted to attend the meeting virtually. This drastically cut down on board travel expenses. BIE hired a contractor, reducing the time the DFO previously had to dedicate to administrative work and reporting. The contractor handled all travel planning, meeting sites, meeting set up, and report writing for the minute and annual report.

Number of Recommendations Comments

For FY2023, the Board addressed two areas of concern with 12 recommendations. In order to support the active recruitment, hiring, and retention of special educators and

related service providers for BIE funded schools the board recommends the following: (1) Conduct a self-assessment of current processes to determine barriers leading to loss of qualified candidates due to the length of the hiring process; (2) Inform all BIE funded schools of local job fairs and collaborate with them on recruiting efforts and make an effort to hold job fairs closer to the schools they are recruiting for, especially in rural areas; (3) Collect data regarding the adequacy and quality of current housing arrangements for school staff in BIE school communities and promote strategies for the development of low cost, no cost housing or relocation support for educators who work at BIE funded schools; (4) Provide a range of options to fill special educator and related service provider positions including virtual delivery systems as deemed appropriate for the individual needs of the students; (5) Facilitate partnerships between BIE schools and educator preparation programs at Tribal colleges, Haskell Indian Nations University, Southwestern Indian Polytechnic University, and other institutions of higher education serving significant numbers of Native American college students to develop "grow your own" approaches and BIE pathway programs to educator preparation; (6) Promote loan forgiveness programs for educators, paraprofessionals and Related Service Providers including Occupational Therapists, Physical Therapists, Speech Language Pathologists, Applied Behavior Analysis providers, School Psychologists, etc, and; (7) Continue robust public relations campaigns across the BIE system to promote the value of education and educators and emphasize the positive aspects of education, particularly special education, and a career as an educator. In order to ensure all students with disabilities, their families, and the service providers within the BIE school system are provided with appropriate wellness support to address social, behavioral, emotional, and cultural needs, the board recommends the following: (1) Increase support for families of children with disabilities to proactively reduce the possibilities of abuse and neglect (e.g., connecting parents to the state parent centers, encouraging activities with regional parent technical assistance centers, connecting parents with school-based resources, and sharing national resources such as the Center for Disease Control (CDC), American Academy of Pediatrics/healthychildren.org, Indian Health Services (IHS), etc.); (2) Increase support and services for students with disabilities in overall social-emotional and wellness through means such as ensuring adequate staffing, providing access to as mental health providers, use of evidence based social-emotional learning curricula, providing trauma informed care and training for staff, coordinating with Indian Health Services and the BIE Behavioral Health and Wellness Program, and accessing other community resources; (3) Increase support and services for special education personnel and related service providers in overall social-emotional and wellness though peer supported networks, capacity building, promotion of resiliency, trauma informed care and related training in order to adequately support students); (4) Foster regular communication between the school staff and the parents/ guardians; (5) Offer professional development and

resources to BIE funded schools on proven behavioral interventions.
