# 20a. How does the Committee accomplish its purpose?

The full Federal Advisory Council on Occupational Safety & Health (FACOSH) generally meets at least twice a year. FACOSH is composed of sixteen members; eight representing federal agency management and eight from labor organizations representing federal workers. FACOSH members are typically Designated Agency Safety and Health Officials (DASHOs-federal agency personnel at the Assistant Secretary level or possessing a similar degree of authority over occupational safety and

health (OSH)-related matters within their agencies), or labor union personnel responsible for federal agency OSH-related issues within their organizations.

# 20b. How does the Committee balance its membership?

FACOSH members are drawn from Federal Government agencies and organized labor groups representing federal government employees. The Committee is composed of eight members from federal agency management, and eight members from labor organizations representing federal employees. FACOSH is chaired by the Assistant Secretary of Labor for Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA). Members serve staggered terms lasting up to three years. An annual, and as needed, request for member nominations are published in the Federal Register to fill these member vacancies. The Secretary of Labor (Secretary) normally appoints members from this list of nominees. However, the Secretary have the authority to appoint individuals who did not submit nominations, but possess the appropriate qualifications to fill the vacancy. In addition, the Secretary can reappoint members to successive terms. To maintain balance and fill vacancies, OSHA employs a multi-faceted approach to inform the general public, as well as the Department's workforce, regarding vacancies on FACOSH, and the period and requirements for submitting nominations.

# 20c. How frequent and relevant are the Committee Meetings?

The full FACOSH generally meets at least twice a year, with subcommittees meeting on an as-needed basis. During meetings, FACOSH considers federal agency occupational safety and

health-related issues proposed by members and OSHA. Deliberations are limited to Committee members. Subcommittee meetings provides an opportunity for FACOSH members to more fully analyze the issues identified by the full FACOSH, and develop recommendations to present to the Committee.

# 20d. Why can't the advice or information this committee provides be obtained elsewhere?

FACOSH is established pursuant to U.S.C. 7902(c)(1), Presidential Executive Order (E.O.) 11612, E.O. 12196, and subsequent E.O.s through E.O. 14109 to advise the Secretary of Labor on all matters relating to the OSH of federal workers. In addition to advising the Secretary of Labor, FACOSH serves as the primary forum for federal agency management and representatives from labor organizations representing federal workers to come together and discuss OSH issues in the Federal Government. No other entity provides this type of broad-based oversight on OSH issues within the Federal Government.

# 20e. Why is it necessary to close and/or partially closed committee meetings?

All meetings of the full Federal Advisory Council on Occupational Safety & Health (FACOSH) are open to the public.

FACOSH was comprised of sixteen members; eight representing federal agency management and eight from labor organizations representing federal workers. FACOSH supported two of the Department of Labor's strategic goals: 1) ensuring that workplaces are safe and healthful, and 2) assuring fair and high quality work-life environments by providing workers a voice in the workplace.

#### **Number of Recommendations Comments**

Since its revitalization in July 2005, the Secretary approved 46 recommendations from FACOSH. Because information prior to this date was unavailable, it was not possible to determine the exact number of recommendations made during the life of the Committee. However, tracking since the revitalization indicated that the Committee forwarded the following recommendations to the Secretary: October 2009 - 26 recommendations of the FACOSH Emerging Issues Subcommittee-H1N1; June 2011 - seven recommendations of the FACOSH Emerging Issues Subcommittee-Training [Four recommendations to the Office of Personnel Management and three recommendations to OSHA.]; December 2011 - one of the three recommendations of the FACOSH Emerging Issues

Subcommittee-Permissible Exposure Limits (PELs)/Occupational Exposure Limits (OELs) (two recommendations were not accepted and were sent back to subcommittee for revision); May 2012 - one recommendation of the FACOSH Emerging Issues Subcommittee-Training [Federal Buildings Personnel Training Act (FBPTA) workgroup], and two revised recommendations of the Emerging Issues Subcommittee-PELs; and September 8, 2016 - nine recommendations for improving the Field Federal Safety and Health Councils. The Secretary approved these last recommendations on December 21, 2016, thus bringing the total number of recommendations to 46.

What is the approximate <u>Percentage</u> of these recommendations that have been or will be <u>Fully</u> implemented by the agency?

#### % of Recommendations Fully Implemented Comments

While most FACOSH recommendations that the Committee adopted from its subcommittees were fully implemented, the following explains those that were not. Two of the 2009, Pandemic-H1N1 Influenza Protection for the Federal Workforce, which required revisions to 29 CFR Part 1960, were not implemented. In addition, seven recommendations directed the Department to request changes at other agencies. While the Department made those requests, the agencies determined those changes were not necessary. Specifically, the U.S. Office of Management and Budget determined that the three FACOSH recommendations concerning OELs were not needed. In addition, the U.S. Office of Personnel Management determined that the Department's four recommendations to alter the 0018 series were not necessary.

primary feedback to federal agencies during the Committee's proceedings, specifically during the Committee's deliberation over subcommittee reports and other agenda items. FACOSH reports and recommendations were available for public viewing on the FACOSH homepage. OSHA also provided feedback to federal agencies through the Federal Agency Safety and Health Roundtable initiative. Roundtable meetings, which met two to four times a year, were open to federal senior safety and health managers, medical personnel, technical experts, labor representatives, and other interested parties.
