The Secretary intends to seek advice from the Committee in the following areas: 1) information rlated to various industry or task-specific guidelines, (2) identification of gaps in the existing research base related to applying ergonomic principles to the workplace; (3) current and projected research needs and efforts; (4) methods of providing outreach and assistance that will communicate the value of ergonomics to employers and employees and (5) ways to

increase communication among stakeholders on the issue of ergonomics. The Committee is responsible for advising the Secretary on ergonomic guidelines, research, and outreach and assistance. The Committee will be expected to report periodically to the Secretary on its findings and recommendations.
