a. Meet and discuss issues relating to minimum standards for state-issued driver's licenses and personal identification cards;b. Engage in direct negotiations for the purpose of reaching consensus on relevant issues;c. Develop consensus-based recommendations for the NPRM consistent with the requirements of section 7212 of the Intelligence Reform and Terrorism Prevention Act of 2004; andd. Respond to other

related assignments made by the sponsor. The Department was directed to use a negotiated rulemaking process. The committee being formed will develop a report or make recommendations for the Department's notice of proposed rulemaking (NPRM) to establish minimum standards for state-issued driver's licenses and personal identification cards. Their work must be provided to the Secretary of Transportation no later that September 17, 2005 and must include an assessment of the benefits and costs of the recommendation. The final rule must be issued by June 17, 2006.

20b. How does the Committee balance its membership?

By statute, the U.S. Departments of Transportation and Homeland Security are members of the committee, which also includes representatives of state agencies that issue driver's licenses and state elected officials. The Committee will also include a balanced group of representatives of other interests that are affected by the proposed rulemaking. The membership balances the range of interests and allows the spectrum of viewpoints to be represented on the advisory committee. It also reflects a balance of genders, geographic distribution, urban-rural representation, and diversity.
