20a. How does the Committee accomplish its purpose?

The Committee members provide information to U.S. government officials and trade negotiators on a variety of trade policy matters. These may include issues that are oriented specifically to the aerospace industry (such as the status of a proposal to eliminate tariffs on imports civil aircraft and parts into Russia) or issues that cut across a number of industry sectors (such as the objectives of the agenda for the September 2003 WTO Ministerial in Cancun). The members provide recommendations to the U.S. negotiators from various agencies, including the Department of Commerce, the Office of the U.S. Trade Representative, Export-Import Bank, Department of Transportation, Federal Aviation Administration, Department of Defense and the Department of State. During their meetings, the members comment and advise on trade policy strategies to forward U.S. economic and commercial interests. As appropriate, they write consensual advice to support and strengthen the U.S. position in multilateral and bilateral fora. The Committee is a unique structure that allows the industry and its

experts to reach a compromise on trade issues and help formulate the U.S. trade policy.

20b. How does the Committee balance its membership?

Members represent various segments of the U.S. aerospace industry, including manufacturers of (a) large commercial transport aircraft, (b) regional and business aircraft, (c) aircraft engines, (d) helicopters, (e) satellites, (f) commercial space launch vehicles, (g) aircraft components, (h) air traffic control systems, and (i) avionics. In addition, to achieve a fair balance of representation, close attention is given to the selection of candidates with geographical and gender diversities. Finally, the Committee includes representation by small and medium size enterprises as well as large companies.

20c. How frequent and relevant are the Committee Meetings?

The Committee meets approximately four times a year. The actual number of meetings is dictated by the USG officials' need for private sector advice. Meetings are held as is necessary to formulate trade policy on current issues. Meetings are relevant to the specific issues and trade policies being considered by the Government. The advice the Government receives from the private sector through this Committee is an on-going process that contributes to the development and strengthening of the US positions in international trade negotiations.

20d. Why can't the advice or information this committee provides be obtained elsewhere?

The Committee structure ensures a unique source of information to the Government. All members have security clearances and through a

continuous, interactive dialogue with Government officials are made aware of Government trade policy at a level not otherwise available to the private sector. Since this Committee remains current in the broad spectrum of trade policy rather than a single facet--as would be the case in the absence of the advisory committee structure--the input of the private sector is acute and yet, perceptive. The advisory committee program, legislatively mandated, is the single formal comprehensive consultative link between the U.S. Government and U.S. industry and has the responsibility to address all issues concerning trade policy.

20e. Why is it necessary to close and/or partially closed committee meetings?

The Industry Consultations Program was established by the Trade Act of 1974 and in accordance with the Federal Advisory Committee Act (FACA). Subsection 135(f) of the Trade Act provides that the ISACs shall be exempt from the provisions of the FACA relating to open meetings, public notice, public participation, and public availability of documents when it is determined that the proceedings would, if disclosed, seriously compromise the Government's negotiating objectives or bargaining positions regarding trade policy matters. ISAC meetings routinely involve these kinds of discussions. The United States Trade Representative (USTR) seriously reviews and evaluates each meeting agenda. USTR issues a Notice of Determination when it determines that it is necessary to exempt a meeting from FACA requirements and allow for closure.

The Committee advises the Secretary and the USTR concerning the trade matters referred to in Sections 101, 102, and 124 of the Trade Act of 1974, as amended; with respect to the operation of any trade agreement once entered into; and with respect to other matters arising in connection with the development, implementation, and administration of the trade policy of the United States including those matters referred to in Reorganization Plan Number 3 of 1979 and Executive Order 12188, and the priorities for actions thereunder. In particular, the Committee provides detailed policy and technical advice, information, and recommendations to the Secretary and the USTR regarding trade barriers and implementation of trade agreements negotiated under Sections 101 or 102 of the Trade Act of 1974, as amended, and Sections 1102 and 1103 of the 1988 Trade Act, which affect the products of its sector; and performs such other advisory functions relevant to U.S. trade policy as may be requested by the Secretary and the USTR or their designees.

Formal written advice addressed to the Secretary of Commerce (and/or jointly to the USTR), or their designees, is reviewed by the Secretary's policy staff and tasked to appropriate ITA unit to prepare a draft response. Commerce's internal procedures require that all responses for Secretarial signature (and/or joint signature with USTR) go through a concurrence process which ensures that the appropriate level Commerce officials are seeing the advice and have a chance for comment. All formal responses must be cleared by the Under Secretary of Commerce for International Trade prior to Secretary's signature, which ensures that the committee's advice is weighed and considered.
